
June 15 —Appointment of the newly-ordained Rev. Willard F. Wiesler as assistant.

August 3 —Sister M. Damien (Kehoe) of the Maryknoll Sisters, a graduate of our school, paid us a visit before leaving to do missionary work in the Hawaiian Islands.

For years the Sisters of St. Joseph who staff our school had been riding in a bus from the Motherhouse on Rocky River Drive to the school, returning in the evening, and for years they hoped and prayed that soon they would have a parish Sisters Convent on the grounds and near the school. Those prayers have at last been answered. The new Sisters Convent will be attached to the westerly end of the school and is planned to house eighteen Sisters. Work was begun in July and is progressing as rapidly as labor conditions permit. The contract was let to the C. T. Regan Construction Company and is to cost approximately \$90,000. It is the last of the permanent buildings in our parish group to be erected and a fitting finale to our building program as we celebrate our Jubilee. To place ourselves in the proper frame of mind spiritually both for our own Jubilee, and the Centenary of our diocese, a mission was conducted by the Jesuit Fathers from November 2nd to 23rd. This should insure a general Communion on that day representing every adult in the parish.

November 23, 1947—The Feast of our patron, St. Clement. It will be celebrated with all due solemnity in commemoration of the twenty-five years during which he has protected and watched over us and heard our prayers. Our Most Rev. Bishop Edward F. Hoban has graciously consented to pontificate at the 12 o'clock mass and Father McGlynn, our former assistant and now pastor of St. Thomas Aquinas Church, will preach. And thus ends the story of these twenty-five fruitful years. It is only fitting that in celebrating our Jubilee priests and people bend their knees in profound gratitude to the Giver of every good gift, and through the continued intercession of St. Clemment obtain His mercy and blessings through the years to come.

you too, will see pictures, pictures of the days when trinkets of gold and golden watches, rings, bracelets, brooches and diamonds played their romantic part in your early life. For years you treasured them as keep-sakes and mementos to the day when an appeal was issued to bring "Old Gold", and you parted with the precious heirlooms so that they might be merged and melted into a single gift to our Eucharistic Lord. The beautiful monstrance, ciborium and chalice pictured here are actually your "Old Gold", and now your precious gift to God.

If you examine the monstrance closely you will find many of the decorative features of St. Clement's sanctuary reproduced there in miniature. The seven panels depicting the life of our Patron and the inscription at their base, the Byzantine cross at the top of the arch, the beautiful statue of the Saint and other incidentals are all clearly visible. A ring of diamonds, also donated, surrounds the center and the base is a replica of the statue of St. Clement who thus appears to be the one who is giving us Our Lord's Benediction.

# A STORY IN DOLLARS AND CENTS

A well-ordered parish will never suffer from that selfish spirit indicated by the phrase: "the dry-rot of parochialism". Good Catholics think and act on a scale big enough to embrace the world, and it is the Church's task to make them realize the size of the world and the responsibility of the Church for all the people in it. Everyone of the two billion people now living has a soul and belongs to God; everyone is the responsibility of the Church, should have the gospel preached to him, and should be made an active member of the mystical Body of Christ. As a tribute of gratitude to all who gave so often and so generously, and to inspire those who come after us to do still more, St. Clement's tells the story of its Missionary Efforts during the past twenty-five years.


